Every Student Succeeds Act Implementation

The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) was signed by President Obama on Dec. 10, 2015. This bipartisan measure reauthorizes the 50-year-old Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), the nation's education law and longstanding commitment to equal opportunity for all students.

The new law builds on key areas of progress in recent years and ongoing efforts to improve educational opportunities for all students in Illinois. The majority of the law does not take effect until the 2017-18 school year, with implementation occurring over the next year and a half. ISBE staff continue to review the nuances of the 1,000-page law and will engage in deliberate stakeholder involvement throughout this process.

On Thursday, April 21, the DuPage ROE hosted one of the first listening tours on the ESSA Act. Almost 90 educators, school board members, and parents were in attendance and provided input on the following questions:

- What do we value and how would that be translated into a State Plan to improve student achievement for all students?
- How should student growth factor into the accountability system?
- What do you want to see in a State Plan to improve coordinated services to schools and districts?
- What do you want to see in a State Plan to improve program and services?

Important Facts about Underage Drinking – A Message for Parents

With prom and graduation season upon us, this is an exciting time for students, as well as family and friends. Celebrations and parties are customary surrounding these memorable events in a teenager's life, but unfortunately, these celebrations can easily turn to a time of tragedy due to the increased prevalence of underage drinking. It is important for parents to understand the underage drinking laws in Illinois and the importance of talking to teens about the dangerous and costly effects of underage drinking.

- It is illegal to provide alcohol to minors and/or allow anyone under the age of 21 to drink alcohol in your home.
- It is a \$500 minimum fine (maximum \$2,500 fine and up to one year in jail) to knowingly allow underage drinking to occur at a private residence. If serious injury or death occurs because of this activity, individuals are subject to a Class 4 felony (up to three years in prison and fines up to \$25,000).
- If teenagers under the legal age drink or use drugs in your home—with or without your permission—you are legally responsible for their actions even after they leave your home.
- If someone is injured on your property as a result of underage drinking or illegal drug use, you could be sued and your homeowners insurance will not protect you. In fact, you may lose your homeowner's coverage.

• If an underage teen drinks or uses illegal drugs in your home and afterwards is injured, causes an injury to someone else, or damages someone's property, you will be legally responsible.

Data shows that the number one influencer on a child's decision making process when it comes to drugs and alcohol is their parents. Talk early and often about your expectations when it comes to your teens behavior.

DuPage ROE Update

A Note of Thanks to Dr. Smith Regarding KIDS

The DuPage ROE would like to communicate our appreciation to Dr. Tony Smith, State Superintendent of Education, for listening extensively to the concerns from educators across the state related to the Kindergarten Individual Development Survey (KIDS).

Dr. Smith recognized the need to revise the requirements and improve communication related to the survey in order to make it "doable" and be valuable to both the state and local districts.

Dr. Smith met consistently with the KIDS Advisory Committee to determine an appropriate comprise and still keeping KIDS data reliable. Highlights of a draft comprise include the following:

- Reduced the number of indicators that Kindergarten teachers will be required to assess from 51 to 14
- The assessment can be from KIDS or an appropriate assessment currently used in the district
- Some modification to the scoring continuum for the indicators will be determined
- Results will be reported to ISBE only once within the first 40 days of the kindergarten year

Kudos to Dr. Smith for listening and brokering a compromise draft plan.

DuPage Health Department Highlights

Zika Risk Very Low in DuPage County

The DuPage County Health Department, along with regional partners the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), are carefully monitoring the Zika virus cases in the United States and elsewhere in the world.

The Health Department wants all DuPage County residents to be aware that the risk of Zika virus is very low in DuPage County. The mosquito that carries Zika virus is rarely found here or elsewhere in northern Illinois. Most cases within the United States have been travel-related.

Zika virus cases are being reported in Central and South America, the Caribbean, Mexico, Puerto Rico, Africa and elsewhere. Zika virus is spread by mosquito bites. People living in or traveling to those areas are at risk for infection. Symptoms of Zika virus are usually mild and last for several days; hospitalization is rare. Contact your healthcare provider if you have plans to travel to those areas.

Student Opportunity

ISBE's Student Advisory Council Seeks Applicants

The Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) is seeking high school students to share their input on state education issues as part of its Student Advisory Council (SAC). Students who will start the upcoming school year as a sophomore, junior, or senior in an Illinois public high school are eligible to apply for one of 12 open spots by May 27. Applications are available online.

The SAC, which was established in 1975, represents a diverse group of students who work with the State Board and State Superintendent to provide student perspectives on ISBE's existing and proposed programs, policies, and regulations. Applicants undergo a competitive review process that looks for strong interpersonal skills and the ability to think creatively, work well in groups, and develop innovative solutions.

Each year, SAC members select a year-long research project and present their findings and recommendations to the State Board. This school year's council focused on the importance of students' feedback in efforts to improve teacher quality and build a more collaborative school community. On March 16, the Board heard the SAC's presentation and approved its recommendation to pursue ways to increase the level of communication between students and teachers and school leaders.
